Shaping the Future of Soroptimist

As part of a global organization, you joined Soroptimist to be part of something beyond your local community. That something is working together to increase our collective impact in accomplishing our mission to improve the lives of women and girls.

During the 2013-2014 club year, we are focusing on shaping our future in four ways: clarity, program, resources and a healthy backbone.

“Clarity” is focusing on understanding our vision, mission and core values, which the SIA Board has recently fine-tuned. Visit <http://bit.ly/VisionMission> to read our new vision and mission.

“Program” means growing our Women’s Opportunity Awards program and focusing—at all levels—on providing women and girls with access to education.

“Resources” is about growing our financial resources to reach more women and girls. For clubs that means contributing at least 10 percent of funds raised locally to the federation. Remember, our programs are funded entirely through contributions and not through member dues, and 81 percent of funds raised go right to our programs.

Finally, “healthy backbone” refers to strong clubs, growing supporters and a sound infrastructure. SIA is currently working on strengthening our club model by eliminating barriers to membership. We are also offering new engagement opportunities through LiveYourDream.org, which has grown to almost 25,000 supporters in just one year!

We should all be proud of our leadership for their vision and courage in moving SIA forward and ensuring a bright future for both the organization and the women and girls we serve.

KOREA REGION

Korea Region clubs SI/Seoul, SI/Hanyang, SI/Namsan, SI/Chungdam, SI/Seocho, SI/Seoseoul, SI/Hannam and SI/Newkangnam, recently gathered to raise awareness about sexual assault. Club members distributed more than 2,000 whistles and carried signs in Seoul. The whistles, which included the Soroptimist logo, are for women and girls if they find themselves in a threatening situation. Kudos to the clubs for their dedicated work on this important issue.

PHILIPPINES REGION

SI/Malabon, Philippines

SI/Malabon, Philippines, recently held its Campaign to Stop Trafficking walk. Club members organized the event, which attracted more than 200 women and girls from the community. Members walked the streets carrying signs and a banner that stated, “Soroptimist International of Malabon supports Soroptimist International of the Americas’ Stop Trafficking Project.” Kudos to the club for its work on this important issue. In other SI/Malabon news, the club recently held its ongoing “Learn and Earn—A Fish A Day Will Go A Long Way” project. Members teach women and girls in the community how to debone milkfish, which is then sold in their Soroptimist store. The livelihood skills provide knowledge and employment opportunities for the women and their families. The project has been featured on the local

radio and television. Says member Lilibeth Chua, “It can’t be denied how endearing the idea of women helping women is in the local community.”

2013 Soroptimist Women's Opportunity Award Finalists

Aziza McGill is a survivor of horrific sexual abuse at the hands of her father from age 8 to 23, which resulted in the birth of four children, one of whom tragically died of a genetic disease. Aziza was deprived of any schooling and hidden from the world, enslaved to her father, who was—to the outside world—a renowned director and MTV award-winner who worked with The Fugees on the “Killing Me Softly” video. Aziza summoned the strength to break free after the state intervened when one of her children, affected by a genetic disease, became ill. Aziza now works as a chef, and supports her surviving children while putting herself through school. The Women's Opportunity Awards will help Aziza complete a liberal arts/communications degree. She hopes to start a nonprofit that will work to protect children from sexual abuse, and is in the process of publishing a memoir that chronicles her life experiences.

The other two finalists requested name changes and anonymity for safety reasons.

Hope Kagoyrie is the single mother of five and a Congolese refugee who inspires everyone she meets. She spent years in war-torn Congo before experiencing the murder of her husband and brothers. Because of her husband's political position, Hope was interrogated and now must live under an assumed name to protect herself and her family. She moved to a Ugandan refugee camp and worked as a nurse for five years. While

there she was attacked three times before being transported to the United States, where she experienced yet another attack before moving to her current location and starting a new life. Hope dreams of working in healthcare again so she may help others. The Women's Opportunity Award will fund her education, enabling her to pursue a nursing career in the U.S.

Hanako Yamada's dream is to become a Haaki-shi, a licensed professional who provides massage, finger pressure and acupuncture to people with physical disorders. But for awhile, that dream seemed out of sight. At 34, Hanako was diagnosed with retinitis pigmentosa, a degenerative eye disease that leads to blindness. She lived with a husband who verbally and physically abused her. Each day she felt like a slave and considered taking her own life. Instead, she found the courage to divorce her husband, take her two sons and build a better life. Hanako is enrolled at a local prefecture school for the visually impaired to prepare for the Haaki-shi licensing exam. With this Women's Opportunity Award, she will undergo surgery to cure her eye disorder so that she can finish school and provide for her family without the constraints of abuse or health issues.

The Importance of Education

Almost 70 years have passed since the UN declared education to be a fundamental human right, yet it continues to be denied to millions of women and girls around the world. Uneducated women are left without options including opportunities for equitable employment, political participation, financial independence, and informed family planning. As a result, they are far more likely to be trapped in lives defined by poverty and exploitation, and are significantly less likely to raise educated, healthy children. Through the Women's Opportunity Awards, clubs can improve these conditions by increasing access to education—while building the collective impact of SIA, and supporting SIA and SI initiatives. 
